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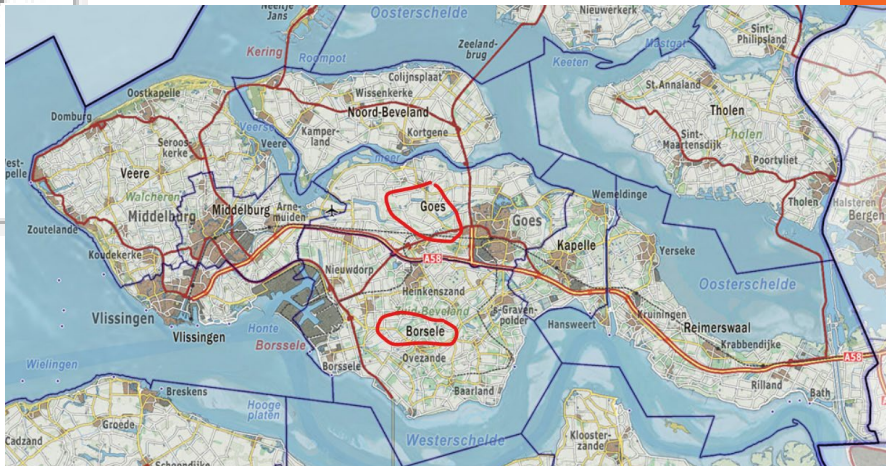

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# Leaving the Netherlands



Settled by Dutch immigrants from the province of Zeeland, specifically Borselle and Goes

The Dutch settlers left in 1847

Leaders: Cornelius Vander Meulen and Jannes Vande Luyster

452 people left on 3 ships: Kroonprins von Hanover, Princess Sophia, and Wilhelm von Wolgast

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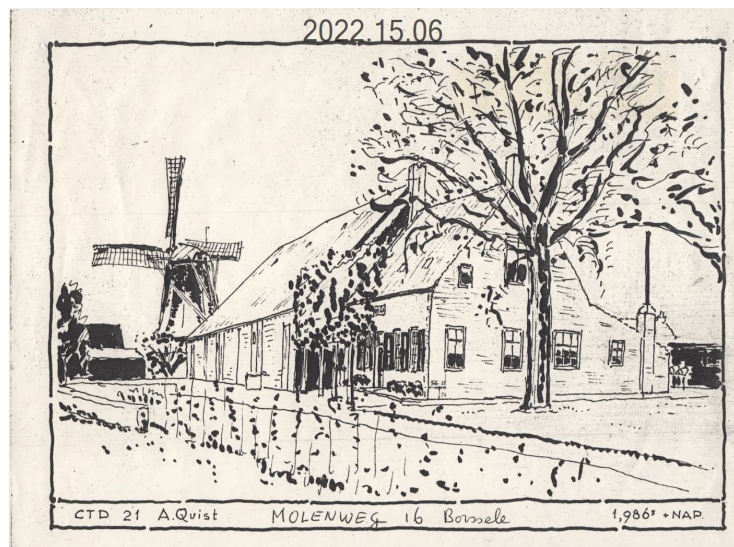
# Why Leave?

## Economic Push

- Civil War in Belgium
- Potato Famine

## Religious Push

- Secession Movement began in 1834
- Religious Persecution
- Vander Meulen, Van Raalte, and Scholte were among the leaders



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# Holland Settlement



## Albertus Van Raalte

- Separatist minister
  - Led a group of immigrants in 1846 who would ultimately settle in Holland in 1847
  - Vision for Education, Business, and Church coexisting

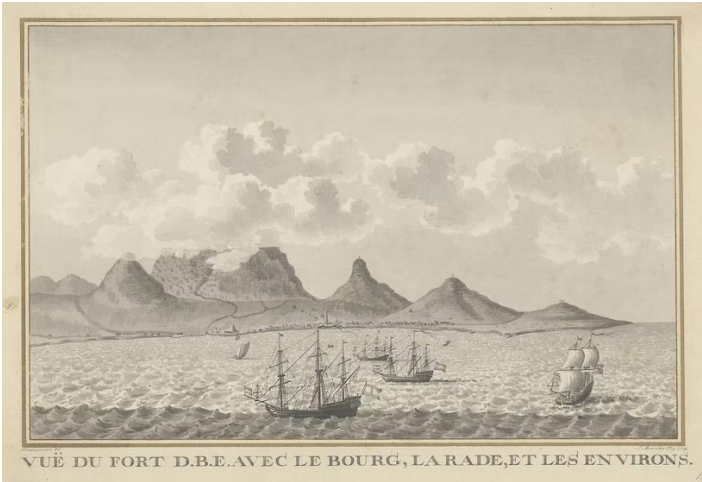
## First Minister in Zeeland

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# The Decision

Jannes Vande Luyster and Reverend Vander Meulen drafted, “Regulations of the Zeeland Society for Emigration to the United States of North America,”



*“You see thus that the matter has come to a head and that we have not allowed ourselves to be fought by the malicious attacks to some of the Zeeland editors. On the other hand we are all the more convinced that also this matter is of the Lord...”*

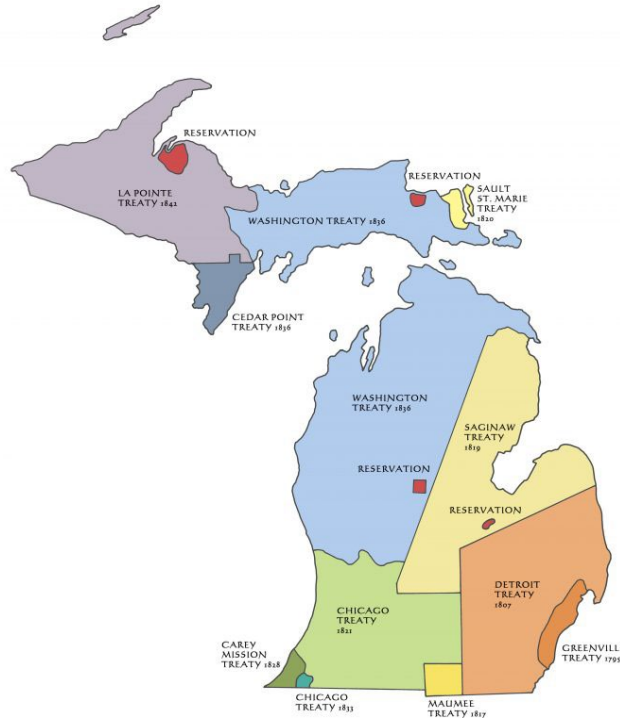


## Ultimate Destination?

- Landed in Black Lake Port in Holland.
  - Vande Luyster bought the original parcel
  - They moved inland from Holland through the forest.
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# Relationship with Native Americans



- **Treaty of Chicago, 1821**
- **Treaty of Washington, 1836**
- **Michigan became a state in 1837**
- **The native population helped teach essential skills to the Holland and Zeeland settlements**

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# Homes

## Lean-tos

The settlers quickly built small sheds and lean-tos for early shelter

## Log Cabins

As they could chop wood, they replaced these with log cabins within the first year

## Brick Homes

Within 5 years, brick was much easier to attain. Veneklasen Brick Co founded in 1847

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# Food

## Drain the swampland

They had to prepare the land for fields, including draining the water and pulling out stumps.

## Simple Diet

Learn to hunt, farm the land, occasional trips to Grand Rapids for supplies.

## Coffee

Dutch people love their coffee! This would be an important staple.

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## Social Life

### Characterized by labor

There wasn't much time for leisure.

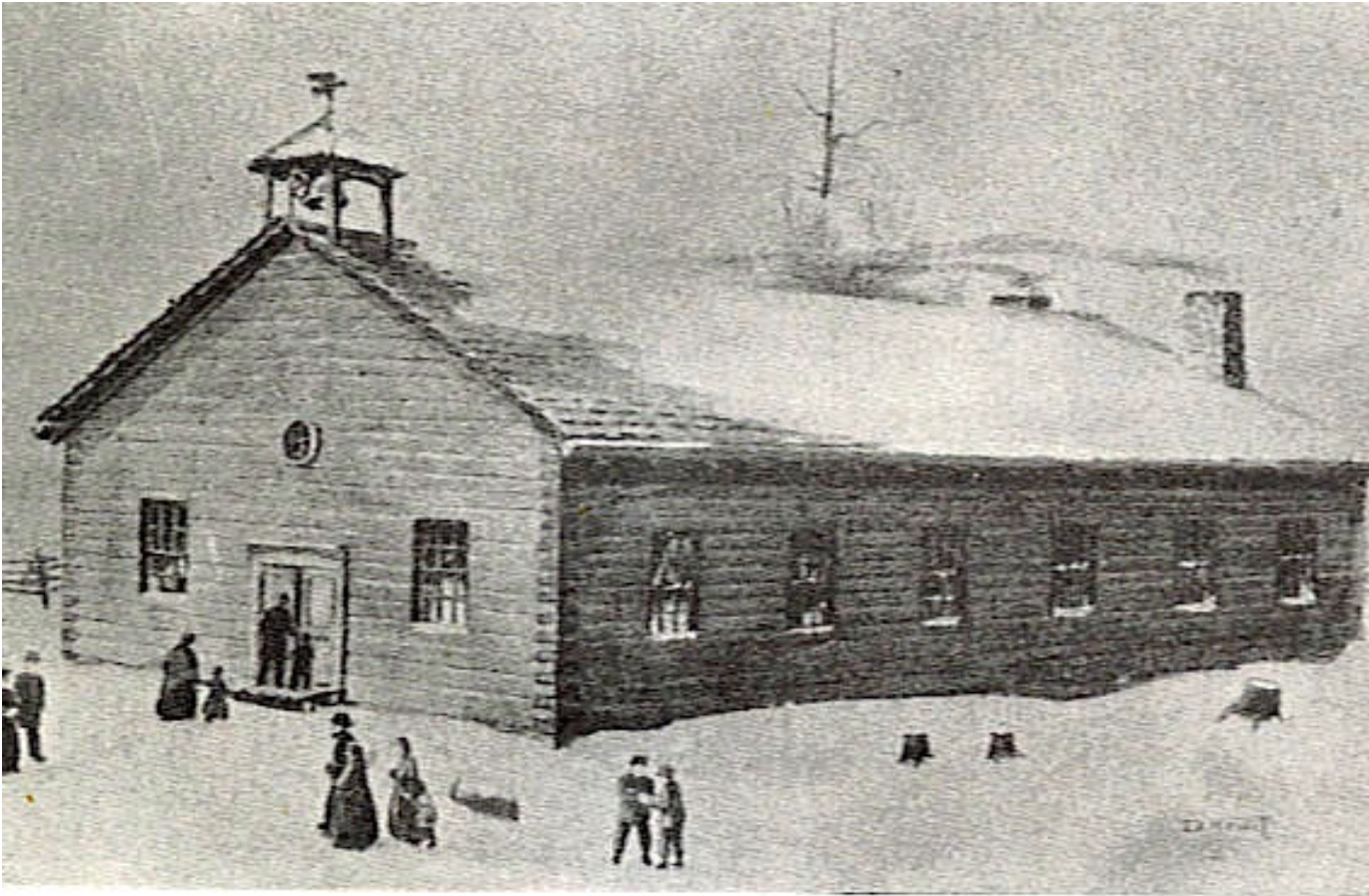
### Church and Religion

Every Sunday the colony would gather at Church to hear a sermon from Reverend Vander Meulen. This was the only time youths would gather at catechism.



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# Religion



## Church was the center

Physically and socially, the church was the center of town. It was the very first building they built.

Pictured: the church built in 1849 to replace the early 1847 log cabin.

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# Zeeland Chamber of Commerce



Created a vision for thriving industry  
from 1937-2012

- Founded by “Mr. Zeeland” Case Karsten
  - Published “The Zeelander”
  - Merged with the Holland Chamber in 2012
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# Industrial Park



## Zeeland encouraged industry

- Chamber of Commerce purchased land just north of Zeeland to be an industrial park. In 1960s
  - City continues to grant bond money to promote Industrial Park expansion and Utility support
  - Case Karsten Drive named in 1995 in honor of a man who did much to support Industry.
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# Clock Industry



Final inspection, adjustment and assembly of clock movements into finished Colonial cases.

## National Leader in clock making

- Dutch brought their skilled woodworking skills with them.
  - Four Major Clock Manufacturers were located in Zeeland in the mid 20th century: Colonial, Sligh, Trend, and Howard Miller.
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# Herman Miller



## Local Story, International Brand

- Founded by D.J Deree, former manager of Star Furniture, in 1927
  - DePree contracted with iconic designers to become a leader in the Mid-Century Modern Design Movement (Gilbert Rhode, Ray and Charles Eames, George Nelson, etc.)
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# Automotive and other manufacturing



## 1970s- Local Support, Regional Market

- Zeeland offered excellent utilities, space, and other support of businesses.
  - Adjacent to the Automotive Industry in Detroit.
  - Gentex , ITW Drawform, Plascore, Innotec, etc.
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# Agribusiness

## The right environment led to a wealth of agribusiness in Zeeland



- Ample natural resources led to a successful environment for agriculture.
  - Entrepreneurial spirit led this to develop into many national agribusiness
  - Zeeland Farm Services, Walter's Gardens, DeBruyn Seed, etc.
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# Hatchery Industry



Chicks were the biggest export of Zeeland in 1920s

- Industry started with a happy accident
  - Chicks mailed through USPS
  - Zeeland High School Mascot
  - Townline Poultry is only hatchery left.
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# Entrepreneurship

For every international business, there are hundreds of small businesses

- Main Ave. has always been characterized by local businesses.
- Zeeland has a major history of entrepreneurship and friendly services.

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# Summary



**Zeeland has maintained a commitment to small-town life with an investment in economic vitality**

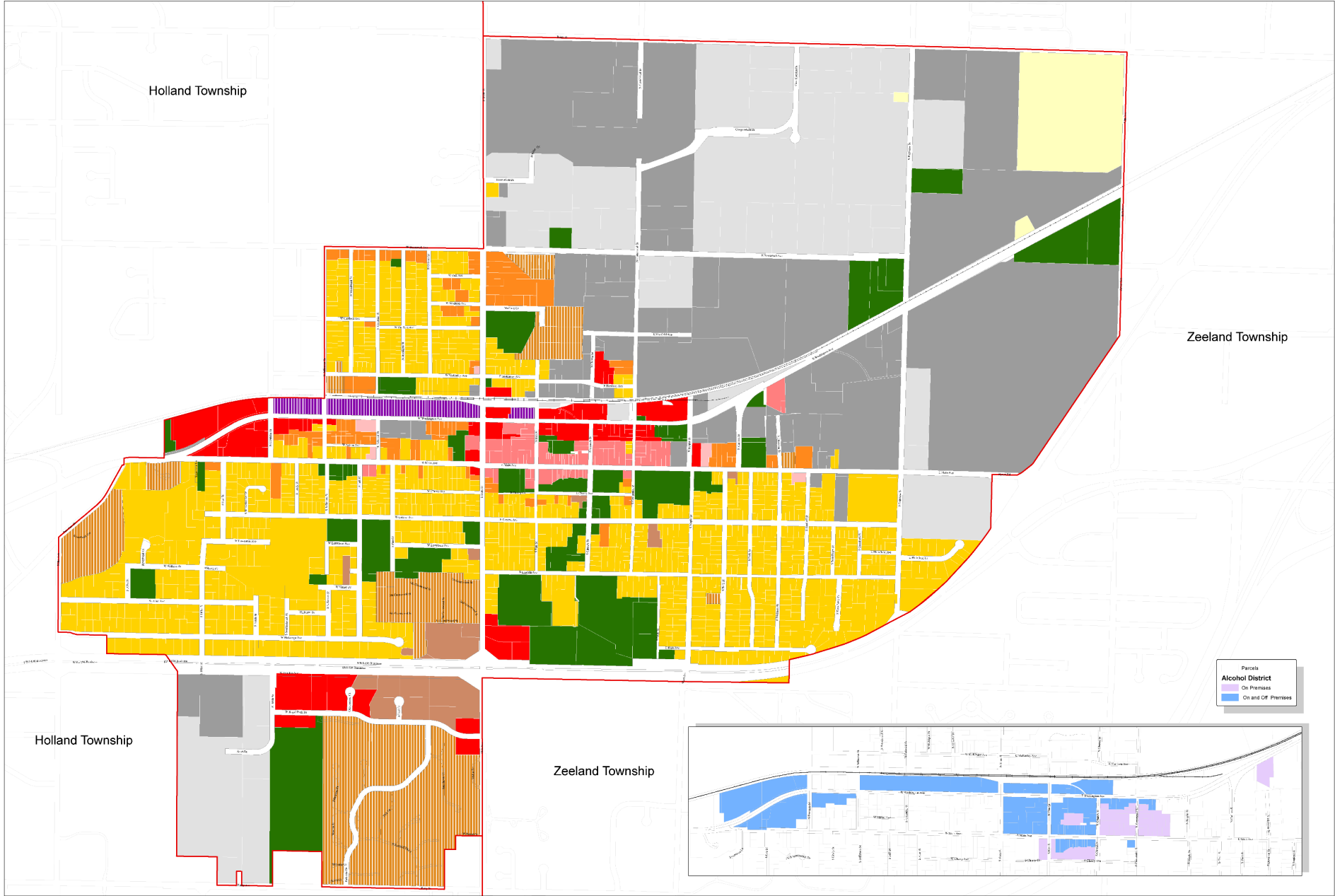
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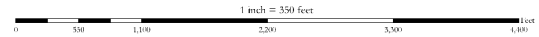


- A little City organizational background

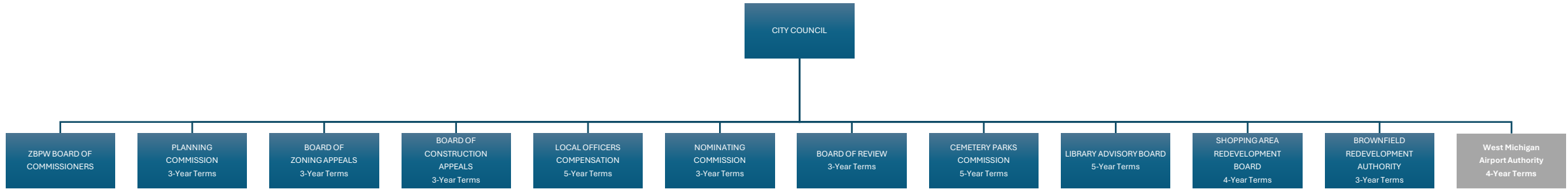

- 
- Policy is set by City Council—7 elected officials.
  - The Mayor leads council meetings and helps set policy for the city.
  - Charter (articles of incorporation)
  - The city manager is responsible for the day-to-day operations of the city along with the rest of city staff.
  - A comparison of responsibilities can be made between the school board and city council and a superintendent and a city manager.

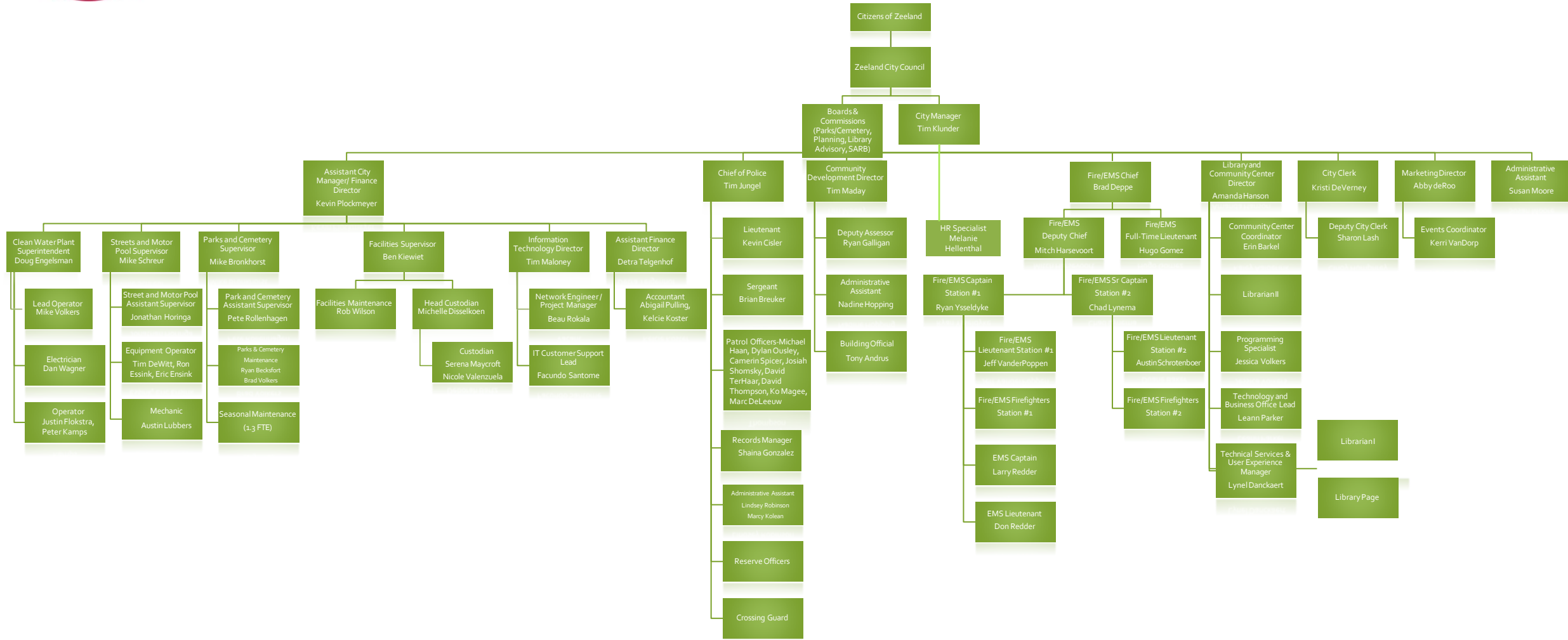

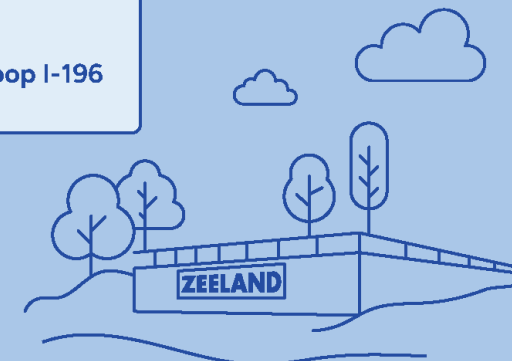


- How do we provide for these services?
  - What is our largest revenue source?
    - Utility fees. These are projected at \$57 million (FY 26/27) and they account for electric, water and sewer.
  - What is our largest revenue source for non-utility (police, fire, streets) services?
    - Tax revenue. We will collect about \$7.2 million in FY 26/27. (+\$1.2 million PPT)
    - The city's taxable value (roughly 50% of actual cash value) will be \$680 million – about 62% of the city's tax base is industrial.

# FINANCIAL SUSTAINABILITY

- The City is a fairly large “business”. The City’s budget is \$81 million
    - About \$54 million is utility related
  - We have 81 full-time employees (51 direct City) and another 15.5 full-time equivalents that work part-time. There are about 145 total employees including part-time, seasonals, etc.

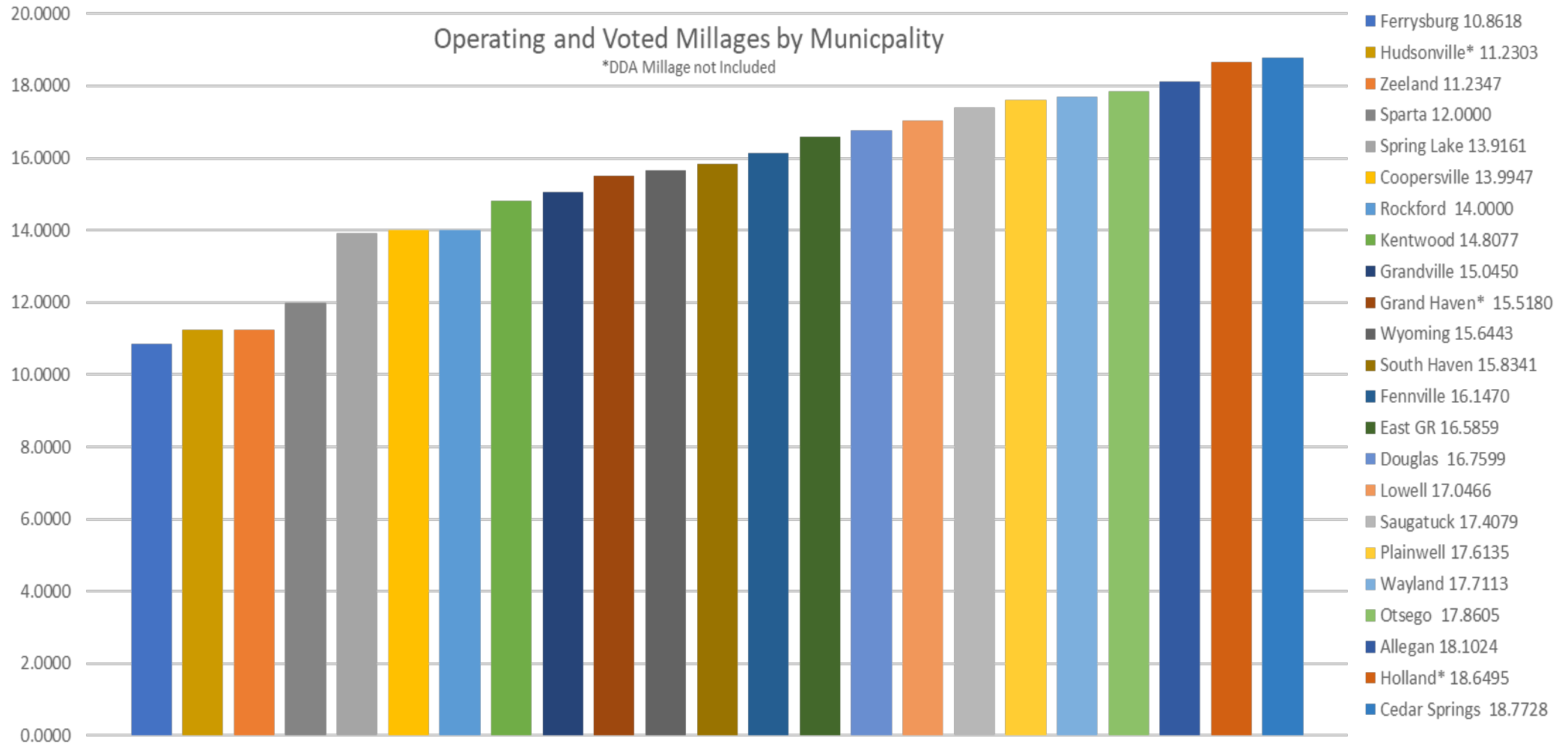

# Maintain Existing Millage Rate

- Budget is based on a millage rate of 11.1354 Mills – COVID years aside, we have maintained this millage rate since 2010
- Each Mill will generate \$651,626 of taxes in Fiscal Year 2027, last year the figure was \$609,688.

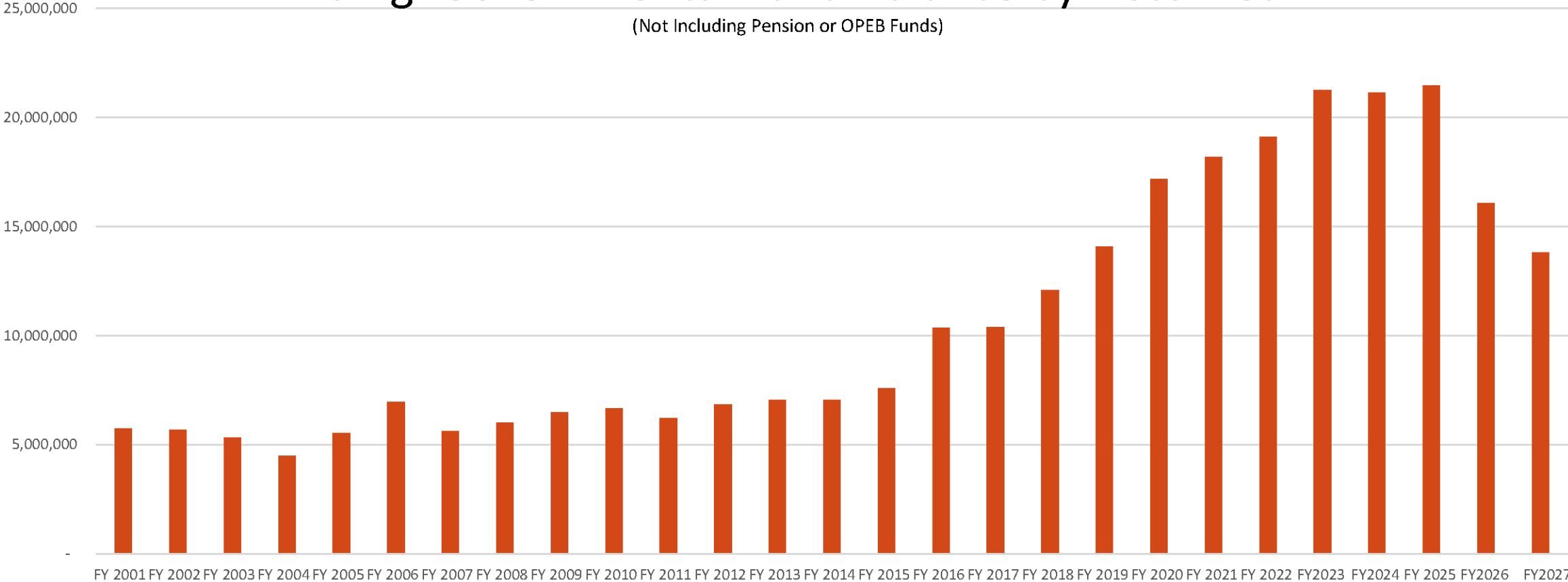

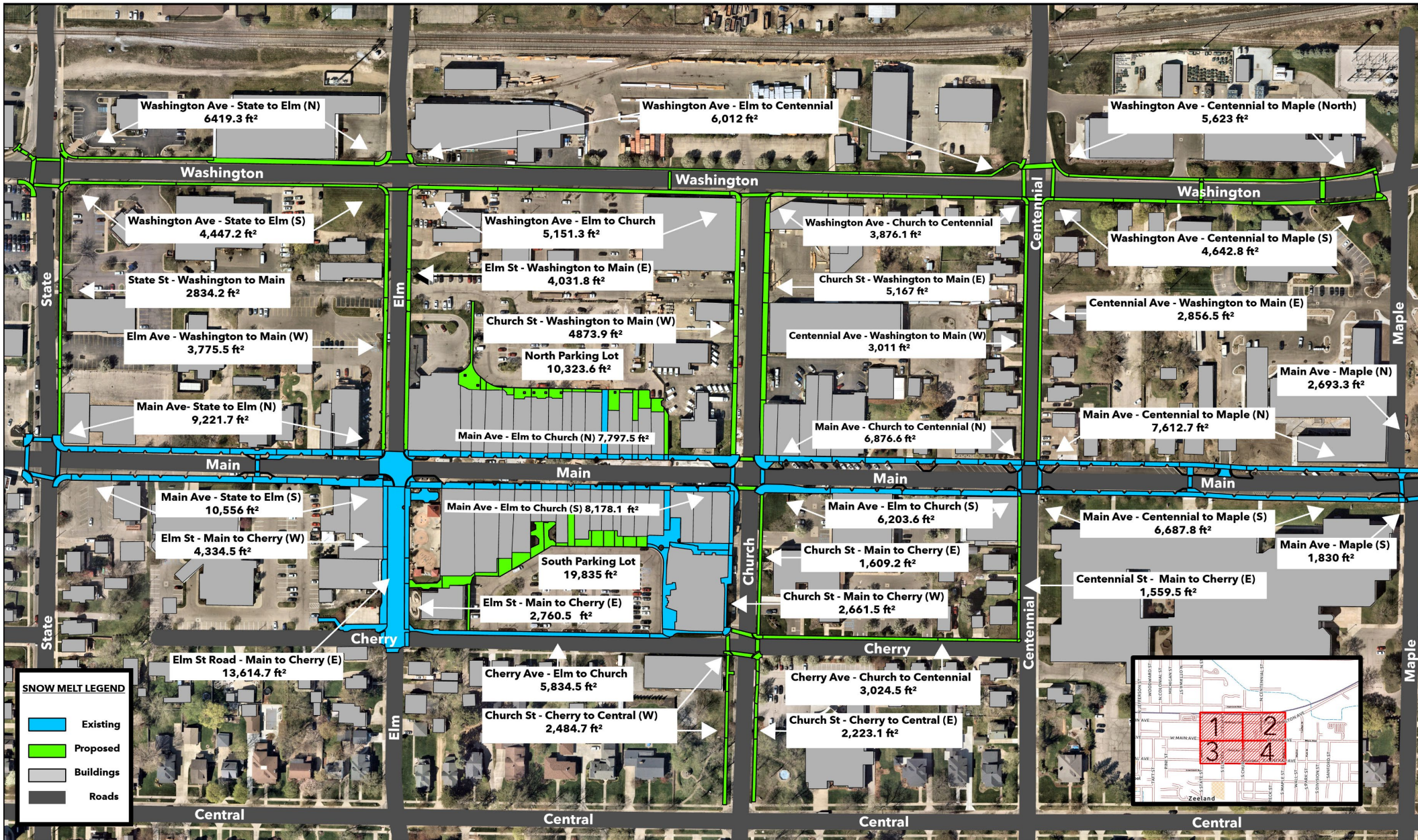

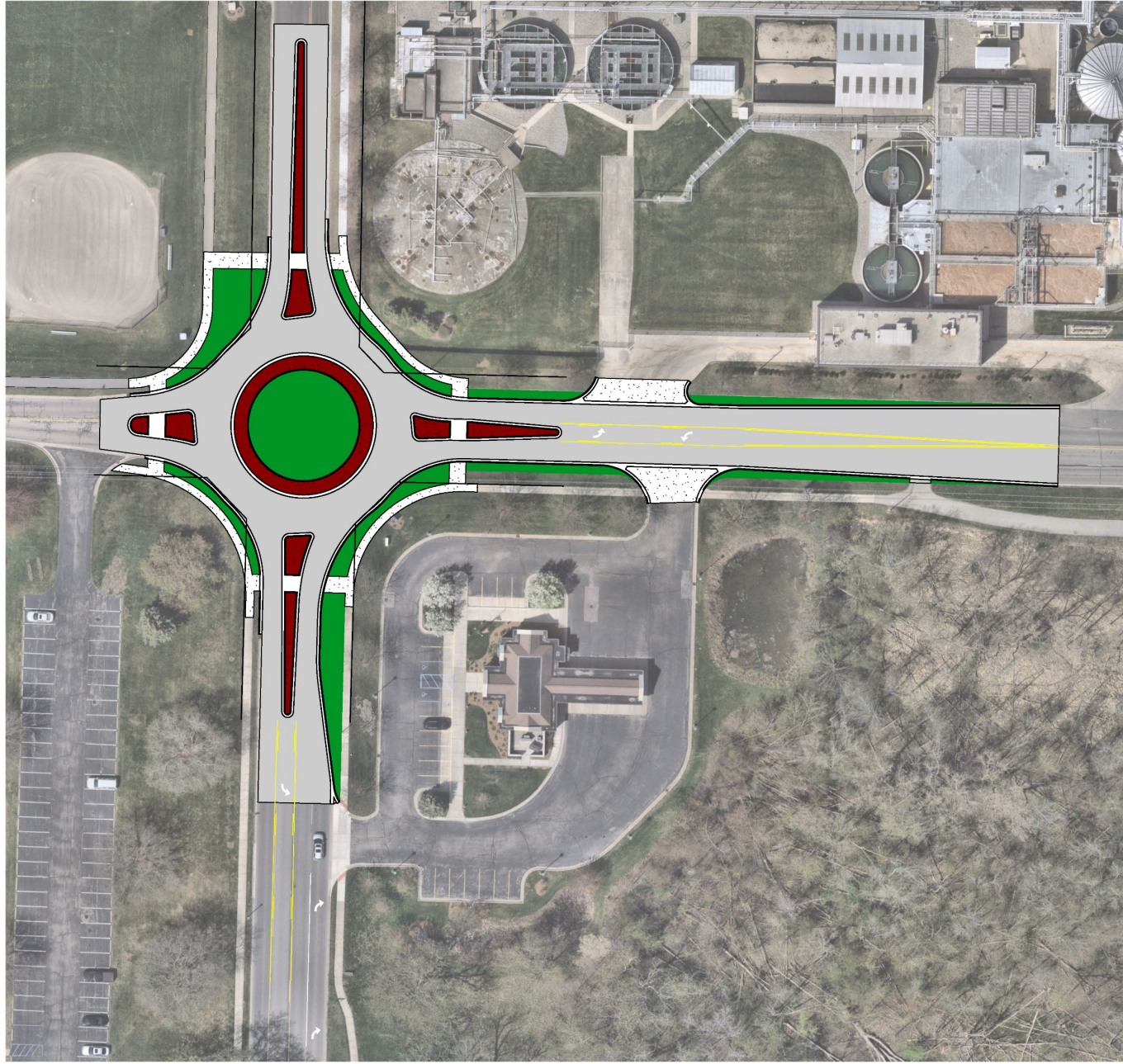

# City Clerk

## The City Clerk's Office is Responsible for:

- Mayor/City Council Administrative Support
- City Manager & Department Directors Administrative Support
- Election Administration
- Record Keeping



# City Clerk

## Mayor/City Council Administrative Support

- Record All Actions, Resolutions & Ordinances of City Council
- Assist City Council with Convention & Training Opportunities
- Preparations for City Council Special Events such as Pumpkinfest Parade, Christmas Parade, & Mayor's Coffee



# City Clerk

## City Manager & Department Directors Administrative Support

- Assists the City Manager with Meeting Packets for Various Boards & Commissions
- Assists the Department Directors with Web Postings & Mailings



# City Clerk

## Election Administration

- Responsible for Current & Accurate Voter Registration Records
- Administer City, School, State, & Federal Elections
- Assist with the Supervision of the Early Voting Process
- Implement all Current & New Election Laws



# City Clerk

## Record Keeping

# City Clerk

## Getting Involved

- **Mayor** – Elected Every Two Years (odd years)
- **City Council** – Elected Every Four Years (odd years)
  - Packets available in the City Clerk's office toward the end of March in the election year. This packet contains all of the required documentation to file for office. All candidates must fill out the included petition & collect a minimum of 25 signatures of valid registered voters to be placed on the ballot. All of this information will be due back in the Clerk's office by mid-April.



# City Clerk

## Getting Involved - continued

- **Boards & Commissions**

- The Clerk's office has a "Consideration for Appointment" form to fill out if you are interested in serving on a Board or Commission which is also available online. This form is returned to the Clerk's office, where it will be shared with the Staff member in charge of the particular Board of Commission for their review. If there are no current openings, the application will be kept on file for one year.
- \* The Mayor, Councilmembers and Board/Commission members must be a resident of the City of Zeeland for a minimum of two years & a registered voter.



# City Clerk

## Getting Involved - continued

- **Election Inspectors**
  - Anyone interested in being an Election Inspector must fill out an application and submit it to the Clerk's Office. To work as an Election Inspector, you must be registered to vote and live anywhere in the State of Michigan. You will also need training every two years.
