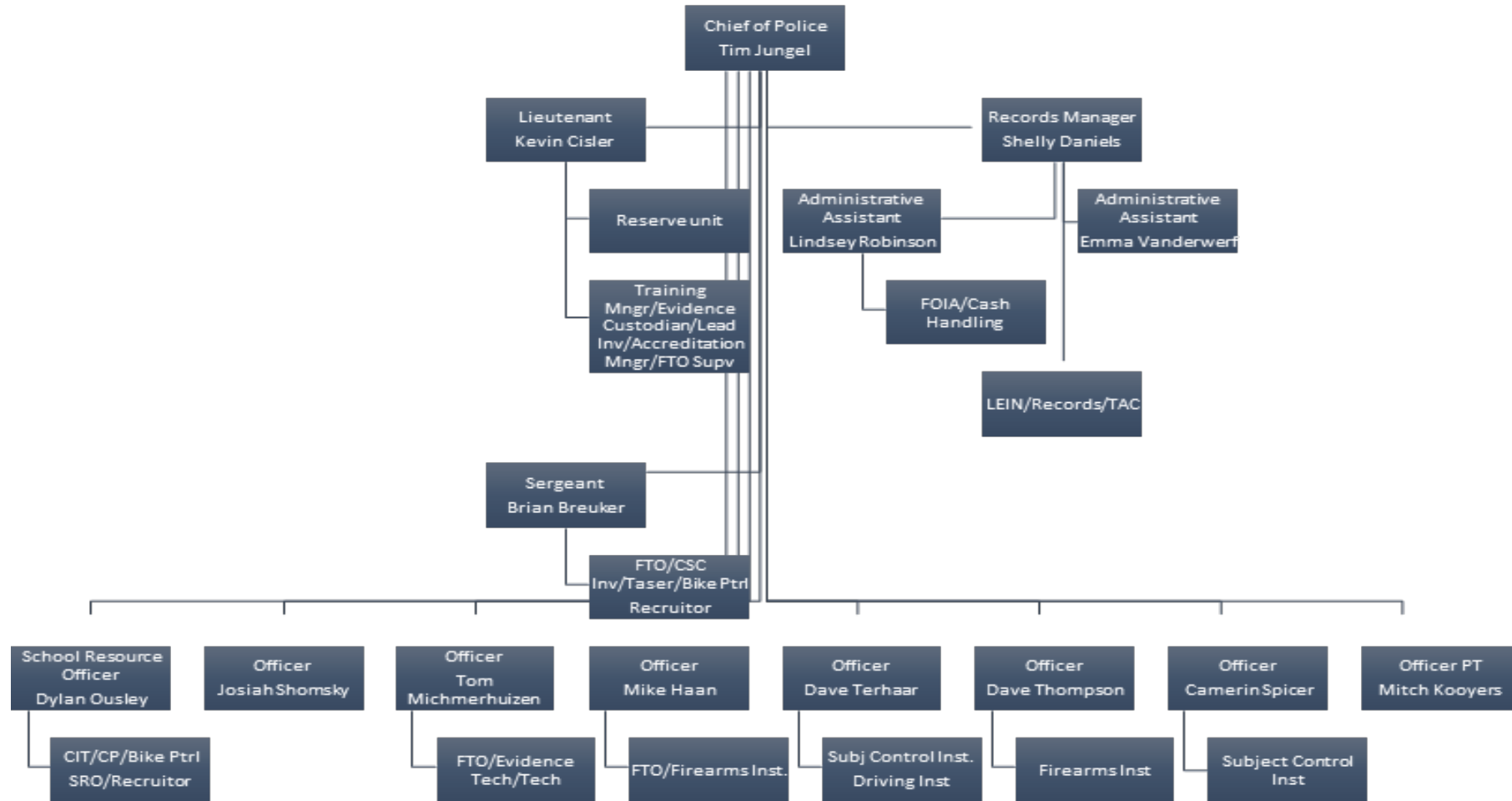

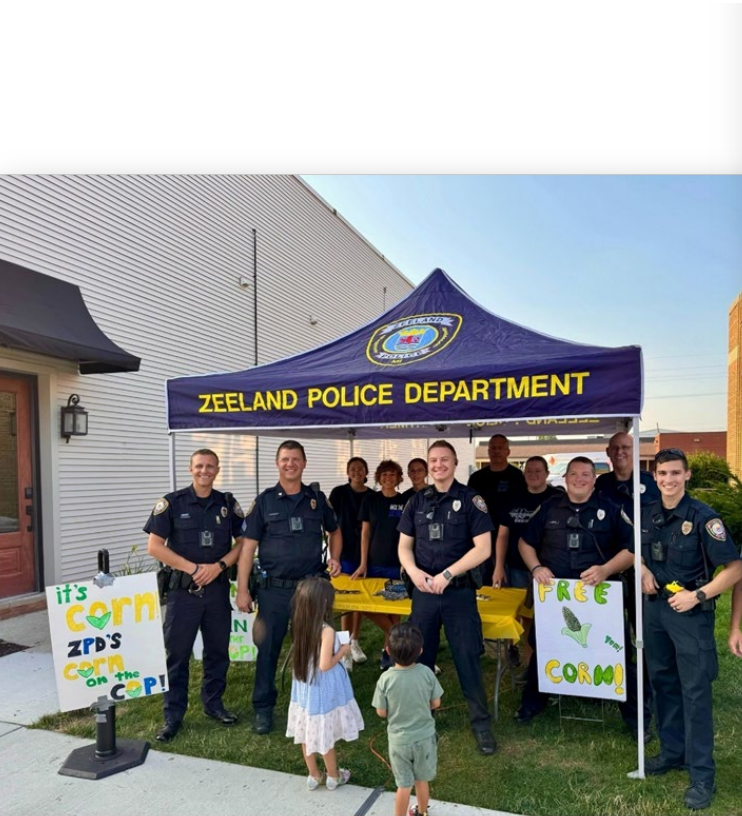

# School Resource Officer



The Zeeland Police Department has had a School Resource Officer for the past thirty-one years. It began when Lt. Tom Ball (ret.) implemented the **Drug Abuse Resistance Education (D.A.R.E)** program. The program was started to teach schoolchildren the dangers of drugs and get them familiar with police officers, so they appear more approachable. In 2004 the curriculum was changed from **D.A.R.E** to **Teaching Educating And Mentoring Students (TEAMS)** curriculum. Along with teaching and being a familiar presence, SROs also investigate and follow up on all investigations and calls for service involving students.

Past SROs include Lt. Tom Ball, Lt. Kevin Cisler, Officer Mike Culver, Officer Ko Magee, Officer Rachel McDuffee, and Sgt. Breuker.

Officer Dylan Ousley started his role as SRO in the beginning of the 2022 school year.

The Zeeland Police Department SRO teaches at Zeeland Public Schools (**ZPS**) Cityside Middle School, Lincoln Elementary, Early Childhood Center (**ECC**), and Zeeland Christian School (**ZCS**).



# *CRISIS INTERVENTION TEAM (C.I.T)*



The Crisis Intervention Team is a specifically trained team that was established in September 2021 to provide more specialized interaction and assistance to those who may be experiencing a mental health or emotional crisis. It is a partnership between the Holland Department of Public Safety, Ottawa County Community Mental Health, the Ottawa County Sheriff's Office, and the Zeeland Police Department. ZPD has one officer assigned to assist with this team.

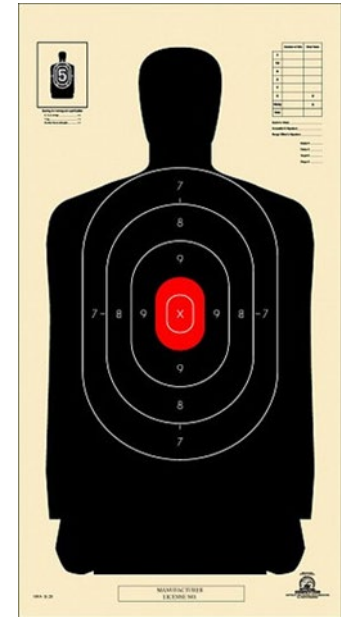

## ***2025 AWARDS***

*Officers Ousley, Spicer, and Shomsky were awarded Professional Excellence Awards.*



On June 4<sup>th</sup>, 2024, **Officer Ousley** was dispatched to a UDAA complaint at Local Company. The victim advised that her 2018 Honda CRV was stolen from the parking lot. She also advised that her keys were in her office and were missing.

Officer Ousley immediately began a thorough investigation. He advised Security to check surveillance videos. He checked the flock cameras and got a hit on the vehicle in Wyoming, and then realized the victim's plate had been put on a different vehicle. Through further investigation, he was able to identify the suspect as an employee from the company. He contacted the Wyoming PD, and through a joint investigation, they discovered that

the suspect switched plates. Officer Ousley went to the suspect's residence in Wyoming and got him to admit that he was involved with stealing the vehicle. He also told Officer Ousley where he could find the stolen vehicle. Officer Ousley was able to collect evidence and get the stolen vehicle returned to its owner on 6/5/2024. The suspect was arrested for UDAA.

# AWARDS



Officer Spicer was awarded two Professional Excellence Awards.

On October 18<sup>th</sup> 2024, **Officer Spicer** was on patrol in the early morning hours and located two suspicious vehicles in a residential area. The vehicles were later determined to be stolen and were attempting to break into other vehicles.

Officer Spicer attempted to conduct a traffic stop on one of the vehicles and pursued it out of the area. Officer Spicer's proactive initiative to investigate suspicious vehicles and keen observation skills allowed him to prevent further criminal activity. This played a key role in the investigation of stolen vehicles, which later allowed

the retrieval of a stolen vehicle and the recovery of stolen personal belongings.

Officer Spicer's proactive initiative and keen observation skills prevented further criminal activity. These skills are an example of professional excellence.

On August 15<sup>th</sup> 2024, **Officer Spicer** was dispatched to a disturbance and trespassing complaint on E Roosevelt. Information given was that an ex-boyfriend was banging on the door, refusing to leave, and was attempting to break into the residence. Officer Spicer immediately responded using tactical skills and approached the residence from the back. As he did, he observed the suspect trying to remove the screen of the bedroom window. Officer Spicer shouted, "Stop Police," and the suspect took off on foot. After a brief foot pursuit between apartments, Officers Spicer and TerHaar were able to place the suspect into custody. The suspect was arrested and charged.

Officer Spicer's quick action and tactical approach prevented a stalking suspect from entering the residence of a female victim. These skills are an example of professional excellence.



# AWARDS



On January 1<sup>st</sup>, 2024, **Officer Shomsky** was dispatched to two burglaries of downtown businesses. While onscene, he observed the suspect moving in the window of an upstairs apartment. After reviewing surveillance videos from ZPD trail cams, he was able to make a positive ID of the suspect. Contact was made with the suspect, and he was arrested. A thorough investigation ensued, and a search warrant was authorized. The search of the suspect's residence was conducted as a team effort involving Lt. Cisler and Officers Shomsky, Spicer, and TerHaar. An overwhelming amount of evidence was collected connecting the suspect to the burglaries.
